School Council Update



Parent Survey




Thank you for completing the parent survey. It will help us to improve further. Some of the headlines from the outcomes:

- Positively, 94% of parents feel their child is happy here. Questions around progress and the quality of teaching were also extremely positive.
- Where you said the school could get better was around communication, responding thoroughly to your concerns and behaviour.
- The vast majority of parents said they would recommend the school.

All of your comments and responses are appreciated and we will work to continue to deliver strong teaching and ensuring your child is happy at school, but we will also work hard on improving the areas you have identified too. We will keep you updated on our actions towards these targets.

Attendance



Attendance is a national priority. It really makes a difference to children's happiness, attainment and their wellbeing. Although staff will always try to support a child when they return from absence, missing sessions consistently can make it difficult for them to keep up as they miss key learning points. Although sickness can be unavoidable, it is important that children are in school when they feel well enough so that they can make the most of their school experience.

At St John's, we aim for 96% attendance.

Lateness can affect children in a similar way. Consistent lateness means they miss the important first sessions. As soon as children come into school, they will do a task to support them with their learning. Being on-time also gives children the opportunity to transition into the day with their classmates and move into the routine of school; if they arrive late, they may miss this, which will make it harder for them to 'hit the ground running' in lessons.

We thank you for your ongoing support with this.

School Dinners

As communicated in summer, school dinners will now be charged at £2.50 per meal. This should be paid through School Gateway and goes directly to our catering supplier.

All Key Stage One children are entitled to Universal Free School Meals, which means they can order their meals through the Gateway without any charge.
